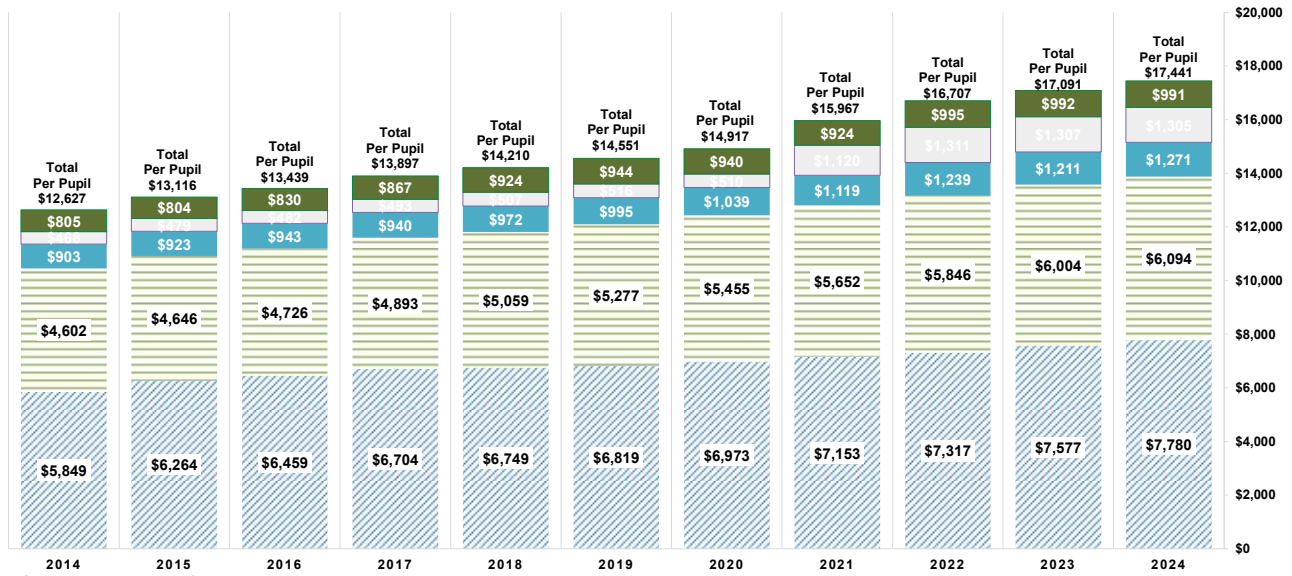

Iowa Specific Pandemic Related Federal Expenditures

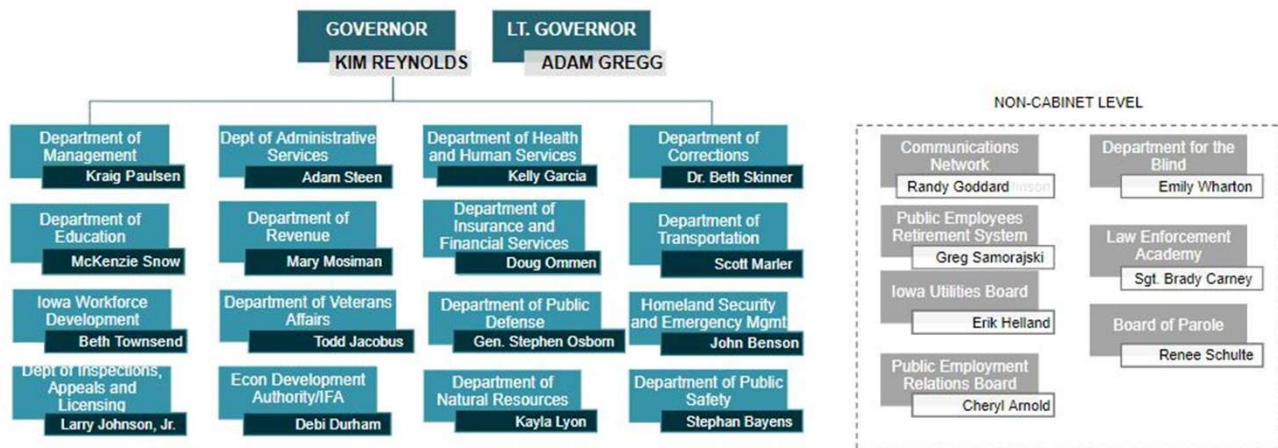
- CRF = \$1.25 billion – must be obligated by Dec 31, 2021
- ARP = \$1.63 billion – must be obligated by Dec 31, 2024
- Infrastructure = \$4.28 billion over 5 years
- Other Pandemic Funds = \$7.38 billion

Background

- Agencies have operated independent IT functions for over 30 years
- During that time, a number of studies were conducted to identify IT efficiencies and cost savings. Recurring themes included:
 - Recommendations for consolidation of core IT functions (like data centers and e-mail)
 - The establishment of common processes
- IT has expanded significantly over the years, but agencies continued to operate IT independently (a “federated” model)
- Over the years, the general assembly created stronger oversight. However, this was largely a regulatory function.



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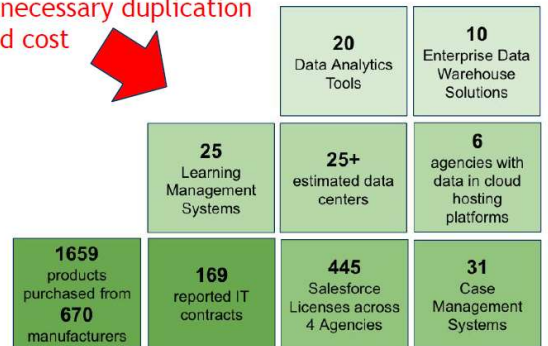
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The results of a federated model

Independent operation of IT systems by each agency resulted in:

- Significant **duplication of IT efforts and cost** when each agency runs IT
- **Higher cyber security risks** with multiple different systems across the state
- **No single source of truth** on IT costs and risks
- **Loss of volume purchasing discounts** on IT hardware / software with multiple contracts for each agency
- **IT Staff cannot be easily shared** across the executive branch

The old “federated” IT environment results in unnecessary duplication and cost

Outcomes and Considerations

- Legislation – repeal Chap 8B and move into chap 8
No significant substantive changes
- Rename OCIO - Department of Management Division of IT (DoIT)
- Greater enterprise visibility
- Procurement controls
- Increased Cyber Security
- Allows for staff surging
- Working Groups
e.g. IT Infrastructure, IT Service Management, Learning Management Systems
- Guidehouse savings est = \$15+ million / year

Boards and Commission Review Committee

- Review of Boards and Commissions required as part of SF 514, Governor's Alignment bill
- Four meetings held from June 26 to September 25 - all open to the public
- Nearly 70 Iowans spoke at the public hearing on a wide range of topics
- Final recommendations filed on September 26th and sent to the Governor and Iowa General Assembly

BCRC Final Recommendations

- 111 fewer boards and commissions, a reduction of approximately 43%
- At least 450 fewer Governor-appointed members
- Increased engagement on boards and commissions and an expansion of the number of Iowans eligible to serve on boards
- Implementation of clear, consistent, and effective licensing standards that will reduce barriers to entry into the workforce while continuing to protect the health and safety of Iowans
